

CIC to support the green revolution

Even before the price of oil topped \$125 and everyone began to question the cost of their diesel and petrol, the CIC has been looking towards supporting electric vehicle (EV) charging in Boscastle for residents and visitors. Electric car sales are booming in the UK with new EV registrations over 75% higher in 2021 than the year before. The government is currently on course to ban the sale of new cars and vans powered entirely by petrol and diesel by 2030 and ban the sale of new hybrid vehicles by 2035. However, the charging infrastructure to power these vehicles needs to continue to develop in order for the green revolution to become successful and we hope Boscastle can support that.

The CIC has identified that not all residential properties in and around the area will have opportunities for EV charging. In addition, for Boscastle to continue to be a tourist destination, visitor range anxiety needs to be alleviated so that

Boscastle is still reachable. Whilst Cornwall Council have recently secured £3.5M of funding that will be used to install 150 EV charging units across their parking estate within the next 18-24 months, Boscastle is not certain to be successful within their project. Therefore, Council has agreed for the CIC to step in to provide the infrastructure - which the CIC hopes to provide at speed for Summer 2022.

Whilst the CIC continues to talk through the legalities with the Council, it hopes that three charging stations offering 22kW (3x more than the usual 7kW home install) will be installed into the lower car park within the next few months. We have also challenged the Environment Agency to try and think outside of their policy box - the CIC is hoping to provide EV charging right next to a source of hydro kinetic energy...now you do the thinking regarding that opportunity!

support you with opening it as a fundraiser."



The Queen's Platinum Jubilee Celebrations 2th - 5th June

In 2022, Her Majesty The Queen will become the first British Monarch to celebrate a Platinum Jubilee, 70 vears service to Country and Commonwealth. There will be year-long celebrations across the United Kingdom Commonwealth, and culminating with the focal point of the Platinum **Jubilee** Weekend June. This will be a long weekend, from Thursday 2nd June to Sunday 5th with the Thursday and Friday being Bank Holidays.

Many events are being planned over those 4 days including The Queen's Birthday Parade on Thursday, the lighting of beacons nationwide on Thursday evening, a service of Thanksgiving at St Pauls on Friday, a live concert from Buckingham Palace on Saturday, and a Big Jubilee Lunch on Sunday.

Local communities throughout the country will be arranging their own events, lighting beacons, arranging choral singing, bands, concerts, and street parties. There will be bunting, Union Jacks, fancy dress, and much jollity. We

reported in the last issue of the Blowhole, that the parish council offered to help set up and coordinate community activities for the Jubilee 'long weekend'. Since then, a group of local people have been meeting as an informal Committee Events help plan and progress the activities in Boscastle. Organisations represented on the Committee include the Parish Council, the Chamber of Trade and Commerce, Forrabury and Minster PCC, the WI, the Primary School and the National Coastwatch, as well as private individuals.

Much work still needs to be done, and the goodwill and involvement of others will be needed, but the basics are shaping up for the 4 day celebrations as follows. Please note the timings are approximate and will be confirmed nearer the time.

A traditional Boscastle Flora dance?

The Events Committee is hoping to stage Boscastle's historic Flora Dance down Fore Street, Dunn Street and Old Road to the Harbour. This will be open to all who wish to join in. There will be optional themes, such as: 1950's, and Kings & Queens.

At the time of writing, the Events Committee is still trying to find a silver or brass band to lead the Dance. This is proving challenging, as some bands have either disbanded or are already booked for their own local events. One option might be for the Boscastle Band to reform for the event. Would any local musicians be interested in being part of this piece of Boscastle's history?

Thursday 2nd June

The Boscastle Buoys will be singing in the lower village. The Official Proclamation will be read by Town Criers across the UK at 2pm, and we have our own Town Crier volunteer lined up to do this. The Buoys will singing free of charge and ask for donations to their chosen charity, the Cornwall Hospices.

Forrabury Church and the Boscastle Beacon

the evening, Forrabury Church will be illuminated from all sides and bunting will have been wrapped around the tower. People will be invited to gather on the Stitches by the Church wall from 9:00pm to witness the lighting of the Boscastle Beacon. The Church will be open and available for refreshments. and shelter if wet. There will be a portaloo by the path up to the Stitches.

The beacon, situated at the Coastwatch lookout will be fuelled by gas to avoid the risk of flying embers or spreading fire, and to ensure it can be lit whatever the weather. A runner will carry a torch from the Stitches up to the lookout for the beacon to be lit at 9:45pm, the officially designated time, as part of 1500 beacons being lit across the UK and Commonwealth.

Laser Light Show

Once the beacon has been lit, there will be a laser light show, choreographed music relayed on the Stitches. This spectacular event will be visible from miles around and last around 45 minutes. A laser light show has been preferred to fireworks, due to concerns over the noise, pollution and litter associated with fireworks. The light show will emanate from the Coastwatch Lookout roof, an iconic building which can be seen from many areas in Boscastle.

News from the Lookout

Iust as the first daffodils are beginning to show there are signs that life is intent on flourishing at the Lookout as well as posters announcing our latest recruitment drive are beginning to appear in local shops, pubs and on notice boards. This is always a serious issue for us as we can't draw on any major urban centres, awash with people looking for an alternative to golf gardening, excellent as those pastimes are. It could well be a serious issue this year as we have lost members through ill health, job changes and the complications of Covid, and we are all hoping for a rise in visitor numbers this summer. You'll find more

details at the end of this article.

We didn't have to wait long for our first serious incident of the year. On 10th January the duty Watchkeeper heard on the a sailor reporting that he was "lost in fog and scared to death" and gave an estimated position. Anyone with any experience of sailing a small boat when fog comes down will know just have disconcerting it can be when horizon vanishes and your level of vulnerability is immediately apparent, no matter how experienced you are.

HMCG responded directly and then contacted Boscastle NCI to confirm the weather and sea conditions in the area, as visibility was less than 500 m. Half an hour later the yacht advised that it was making for Padstow Boscastle relayed the message to Falmouth Coastguard who already tasked the Padstow Weather Lifeboat to assist. With visibility

improving the Station was able to report that the yacht and Lifeboat were now visible 2.5 nm distant, en route to Padstow. On this occasion we could have changed our mission statement from" Eyes along the Coast" to "Ears along the Coast"

With an interesting collection of named storms in recent months the county has taken a bit of a battering, however, exposed as we are on the even Storm headland, Eunice left us unshaken, if a little stirred. Thanks to the expertise of our team and the resilience built into our systems neither the building, our selfcontained power systems nor our communications were affected.

We had something else to look forward to as we held the first Annual Dinner and Presentation Dinner since 2020 at The Wellington Hotel on Tuesday 1st March, when the long service of some members was recognised including awards for 20 and 15 years of Watchkeeping.

In this Jubilee Year the Palace has requested that as many NCI stations as possible should light a beacon on the evening of Thursday 2nd June as part of the 4 day Bank Holiday Celebrations. Our intention is to light a gasfired beacon around 2145 on 2nd June and we are liaising with Forrabury and Minster Parish Council to integrate our efforts with other local plans, with particular reference to the safety of spectators in and around Willapark. Further details will be available when the plans are confirmed.

Once again this will require a team of willing volunteers, so this is the ideal opportunity to start your training and play your part in this unprecedented event.

We would be delighted to welcome you as a volunteer Watchkeeper or as part of our fundraising team. We are beginning to get our training schedules back on track but there are still so many variables to take into account until Covid retreats permanently.

COOKERY CORMER

Chicken and **Yoghurt Curry**

There are times at the end of a busy day when all you want is something quick and easy. When you come home tired and lacking in inspiration, all you want to do is reach for the frozen ready-meal so that you can have dinner on the table within half an hour or so.

I'm a big believer in cooking your own food but I do sometimes want instant (or nearly instant) gratification. So here is one of the most delicious ways to cook chicken, which you can have on the table inside 30 or 40 minutes. I like to cook pieces on the bone but it does take a little longer and I know most prefer people boneless chicken. You can of course make it with chicken breast but I'm going to make a plea for chicken thighs as they have a better flavour.

This is one of those easy, foolproof dishes that works every single time - adapted from a recent article in Observer Food Monthly - and you can of course enjoy it with chutney, any flatbreads or with rice.

Natural yoghurt 200ml Salt 1 tsp Garam masala 1 tsp Ground turmeric ½ tsp Chilli powder ½ tsp Garlic 2 cloves finely

chopped Knob fresh ginger (about the size of a walnut) finely

Chicken thighs 600g,

chopped

boneless, skinless, cut into 3cm pieces Sunflower oil 2 tbsp Cumin seeds 1 tsp Tomatoes 2, thinly sliced Coriander leaves 20g, finely chopped Serves four

Mix the yoghurt, salt, spices, ginger and garlic together in a bowl. Add the chicken pieces and turn until well coated in the marinade. Let the chicken marinate while you prepare the curry base.

Heat the oil in a pan and add the cumin seeds. Once they start to sizzle, add the tomatoes and cook over a low to medium heat for 5 minutes until they start to soften.

Add the marinated chicken with any excess marinade and mix well, then bring to the boil. Cover and cook over a medium to low heat for 20 minutes or until the chicken is cooked through.

Sprinkle with the coriander and serve with chapattis, naan, or rice.

Enjoy. Lean back, give a contented sigh and enjoy the rest of the evening. What's on the telly tonight? Pat Thorne

Woodland and Wildflowers

Cannegos is one side of a steeply sloping hill, the top of which is currently used for openly grazing sheep. As the hill slopes east, the ground is more sheltered and becomes willowy and brambly scrub, eventually becoming naturally regenerating young woodland. On the steepest decline is native broadleaved woodland and a stream covered in bright green mosses and lichen, which runs into the river Valency. In 2018/2019 we agreed to plant a eucalyptus plantation in one of our very steep and scrubby fields. I'm hugely planting interested in trees to help to reverse climate change. Eucalyptus can be beneficial to the environment because it is fast growing, quickly capturing carbon as well as being a brilliant source of extremely dense timber. At a eucalyptus plantation nearby, trees are planted in neat rows, each around 3 metres high. But it is dark beneath the trees with very little vegetation on the forest floor.

I now realise the trouble with trees. They are well for carbon researched capture, but often rough grassy areas are seen as needing to be 'restored' to woodland rather than applauded for being busy ecosystems in their own right. An ecological survey for the land by Lawrence from **FWAG** Sampson Wildlife (Farming and Advisory Group) helped me understand the land,

highlighting important wildlife areas, where no changes should be made. diverse grassland beneath the eucalyptus is a County Wildlife Site (CWS). This type of rare hasn't grassland been changed for centuries, and the many different flowers support a wide range of mammal, invertebrates and threatened species. Prior to the survey this area had been seen as 'just scrub' a misconception I had fallen

A strategy to keep this grassland preserved to trial grazing livestock beneath the trees. Creating a variety of grass heights in the plantation would encourage the growth of so many different species, and the stock could help fertilise the ground below. The far reaching benefits of agroforestry silvopasture (essentially grazing under trees) are not widely recognised, the sheep are not able to go into the eucalyptus plantation if we are to receive our grant. I'm currently speaking to the Forestry Commission to see if an exception can be made. Their concerns overgrazing, which can be a problem for new trees (as well as species rich grassland). Trialling small areas and keeping sheep in for short period will mean overgrazing is unlikely. The forestry commission are also concerned about the sheep browsing on the leaves, which are already out of their reach.

Another part of my plan

is to create more sheltered, wooded grazing areas for the livestock. Thanks to a generous grant from the Tree Council and National Rail, this is becoming a reality. We are about to plant over 2000 native trees in clumps dotted about in our lowest, flattest and least diverse paddock. Our land is coastal, constantly suffering strong winds. Sheltered grazing can dramatically increase the survival rate of lambs, as well as boosting the growth of grass by up to 20%. In this location native trees will achieve my goal of increasing wildlife and capturing carbon. Breeding birds, sheep and grassland will all benefit from the

Learning to manage land effectively for wildlife, biodiversity and carbon as well as meeting the demands of grants has been a challenge. I cannot remove the eucalyptus, but managing the area in a way that would preserve this scarce grassland would be no small feat. It has been a learning curve and I now feel confident about planting the right trees in the right places. It is thanks to the knowledge from the amazing team at FWAG, Tree Council, and research by Iodie Hession that we can create this haven for wildlife.

The Trials of Storm Eunice

Technology drives us mad but we can't live without it!...or can we?

Well, during Storm Eunice most of us discovered just how much we depend on it, especially for communication. And some of us re-discovered resources we hoped we'd never need again!

We drove back from visiting our family in Essex on the Friday when the South-west was blanketed with red weather warnings: call us mad but we did it, to find slates from the roof on our drive, no power, no heating or hot water, no phone and no internet. Add to this no functioning network on either mobile so how to contact anyone especially the family? After much fruitless scrolling through settings, connections etc. Mike discovered that he could still send SMS text messages on his pay-as-yougo "emergency" phone, so thankfully we were able reassure our nearest and dearest that we were not after all lying in our wrecked car under a fallen tree! I had recently taken possession of a spanking new phone but could I find how to send texts through SMS? Not on your life! My signal did come back eventually however, so we could at least communicate with the outside world once again.

We have a static caravan in our garden which has an ancient gas stove in it and it still works. During the evening and the following morning, it was to and fro between bungalow and caravan, boiling up our state-of-the-art whistling kettle (remember them?), filling flasks and hot water bottles and cooking a meal (courtesy of M&S.) Meanwhile I lit our coal fire, and how grateful we were for that, and rounded up a couple of batterypowered lanterns to give us at least some illumination. Plus, we had some batterypowered Christmas lights which, draped around the mantlepiece, gave us a wee bit more light and made things more cheerful and even a bit festive, as though our very subdued lighting was actually by design

rather than enforced.

No TV or radio, light too poor to permit reading comfortably, and the lounge the only warm place in the bungalow, it was an early retirement to bed with hot water bottles, bed socks, and warm jumpers. It also helped having an additional source of warmth in the shape of Danny, our cat, who snuggled down between us: think he was cold too!

Thankfully, power restored by Saturday afternoon, and grateful thanks to all who worked in what were very dangerous conditions to restore it. We weren't so lucky with our

telephone or broadband which only returned on Wednesday. How I used to wish, sometimes, for the telephone to stop ringing, and for the incessant blizzard of tedious e-mails to cease. When this wish was actually granted, it was bliss to begin with, but it didn't take long before the sense of being cut off and isolated set in. Similarly, we too easily take for granted hot water, heating lighting. Standing in an icy cold bathroom, washing with just a small amount of hot water from the kettle, took me back to a childhood in which the only heating at home

came from two coal fires and an ancient boiler in the kitchen.

It's been very interesting sharing with friends their experiences discovering how very enterprising they have been. Wood burner stove tops have proved very useful in boiling water enterprising and one friend even cooked jacket potatoes and fried eggs on it, though she does feel her skills in this direction need some refining as the potatoes, though very tasty, had shrunk to minute proportions. Candles have been used widely, and at least one resourceful lady employed her husband's headlight for navigating around the house at night, during the blackout. Old games have been dug out and played and couples have actually found themselves talking to each other instead of watching TV, playing games on the computer or staring at their mobiles. Of course, old habits die hard, and some will go to extraordinary lengths to find a mobile signal, even so far as walking up to

the church porch to get a signal or holding their mobile phone pressed up against the one upstairs window where a faint signal could be found. But how frustrating to have followed the advice of relatives to get one's mobile topped up before the storm came, only to discover it had all been for nothing!

Storm Eunice certainly tested us all and I am well aware that in certain areas things have not returned to normal yet. I am very grateful though to return, as one friend put it, back to 2022.

With cybercrime fast taking over from the oldfashioned crimes robbery and burglary, the Government has classified it as a level one threat to the country on a par with terrorism and war, as Mowesi Marshgate heard at their March meeting. Knocking over a post office is a high-risk, low reward crime, so more and more bad guys are opting for lowrisk, high reward crimes online.

Former City of London DI Grahame Mace now works for the South West Regional Cybercrime Unit, and one of his jobs is to visit clubs, groups, companies and schools to warn of the ever increasing threat posed by cyber criminals, who can

empty your bank account if you fall for their horribly ingenious tricks.

Graham showed the members and several visitors how to create a high-strength password could remember without writing it down, which might take a hacker years to decode, and said strong passwords and being aware of the giveaways in phishing mails were the two most important factors in staying safe. Always check a mail that demands money, especially if it urges haste, and always, always report a cybercrime, he said.

At February's Annual Meeting the Mowesi reelected their President Liz Long for another term, heading up a committee of six ladies. The coming year's programme includes bead necklaces, a lifestyle coach, a talk on the British Army and a presentation on the Mayflower, the ship that took the Pilgrim Fathers to America in 1620. After a degree in Fine Art from Reading University, she won a Royal Academy David Murray Landscape Painting scholarship in 1969 which brought her to Cornwall. The subject matter of her painting (and drawing) ever since has been the landscape of Cornwall and the people, creatures and plants she has shared her life with. She lives in Trevalga, and its the wild seas and skies, the tough gorse and cattle, the bays and boulders of North Cornwall that are celebrated in her work.

More than a decade ago, we worked together on the Poetry Society Centenary project, The Great Trees of Cornwall, visiting Dizzard Woods every month for a year. I sat tamely writing notes for poems in a small notebook, on a slumping piece of land beneath ancient twisted oaks, while in front of me her entire body wildly gestured, apparently directly onto

paper: the results were astonishingly good. Her physicality is, for me, one of the strengths of her painting, that and her honesty. She has always grown food for the family, and that closeness to and understanding of landscape from the rock and earth up informs the paintings - and provides additional subject matter, whether her own pumpkins, or Pethick's fat lambs. She returns again and again to the same challenging subject matter, constantly demanding more of herself - and of those around her. Her beach paintings contain profound the most meditations on rock that I know; in fact her painting of anything seems to seek out the essence of the thing, a fearless facing of what is actually there.

She has largely worked outside, carrying small (and large, ever larger!) boards onto the cliffs, braving wind and rain; her attic studio, with its new huge Velux windows, gives wonderful views

spring sowing

vegetable beds in late autumn, spread a layer of compost (or even cardboard and compost if a few perennial weeds have set up home) and leave the weather to do the rest. By spring I'm all ready to start sowing. But some years I have overwintered a few vegetables that are easy to grow whatever the weather - garlic, salad rocket, spring onions and maybe broad beans - they resist moderate frost and are low to the ground, so do not get blown over. These will need some protection though and my favourite trick is to make a fleece tunnel using flexible



pipe lagging for frames

pipe lagging (Trago Mills sells lengths of exactly the right size) held in place short lengths of with bamboo cane stuck in the ground and then covered with fleece. I like to use fleece for extra warmth, but

I usually clear the raised if there's likely to be much wind, fleece supported on hoops can be damaged by wind getting underneath it when it will act like a sail. I'm glad I was a bit slow in getting my act together this year and didn't build my fleece tunnel before the gales in February.

> I try to avoid sowing plants out of season, which only gives you extra work in trying to protect them, and usually end up sowing rather late. For example, I tend to sow tomatoes around the middle of March rather than in January or February, and runner beans perhaps as late as May. Remember the old saying, that later sowings in spring always catch up, as days grow longer and warmer. It's the opposite autumn, when you need to be timely to make full use of the shortening days. But we don't need to think of autumn just now when we've got the whole glorious growing season ahead of us.

> This summer I'm going to try Mexican sunflower. I saw it growing in a London park last year and loved


its bright orange flowers. I've been told my garden is too cold but I'm going to give it a go. I really like the dark blue or purple/ bright orange combination such as marigolds grown with purple salvia Amistad, brilliant Californian poppies contrasted with Cerinthe major. Some of these varieties are going to be sown this month.

Seeds like to be damp, don't thev need watering or feeding. What they really like is to be kept warm and that's why you'll see a sunny windowsill or conservatory mentioned in the sowing instructions. Some even like to start life in the warmth and the darkness of an airing cupboard.

Seedlings, like all babies, need gentle handling and don't like sudden changes in temperature, or to be cold. They need to be held very gently when you are transplanting them (never by the stem), give them room to grow, keep them safe from late frosts, get them gradually used to the great outdoors, and then they will grow up to be big, strong healthy plants. So, let's all grow something new from seed this year -I'm going to.

News from a Smallholding

In our last article we wrote about The Bank and our great plans - we can proudly say that The Bank is now in place! It needs a little refining, the gates adding and planting across the top but it is there and the grass has already started to grow. The ground around it is... muddy, in fact if we were mud farmers it could be classed as an excellent yield that exceeds expectations. Even the sheep won't cross its squishy expanse, and that is saying something.

Work has begun on the new vegetable patch and this really is a mammoth task as there are no excavators or dump trucks involved; just us, a couple of wheelbarrows and an array of digging tools. At the moment the main project is to get the polytunnel up; it is currently in bits in the sheep shed and we're going to need the shed for lambing next month! There has been a lot of digging, filling and levelling but we are nearly there. Once it is up we'll be moving on to yet more levelling (we really underestimated how hard it would be to make a flat bit out of a slope), then we can do the fun

bits; sleeper borders, paths and THEN maybe some planting if we're lucky.

We decided to get ahead of the game this year and plant beans in pots in a cold frame. The idea was that we'd be able to plant these out once the patch was ready, and we all know what happens to the best laid plans! Yes, mice nibbled the shoots, dug up the beans and decimated 120 sowings. There were a few choice words and we're coming up with a Fort Knox level cold frame for the next sowings.

On the bright side, the sheep are getting on rather well. We have some rotund looking ewes; one of which (named Hazel) looks just like a child's drawing of a sheep - a massive ball of fluff on spindly legs. She tends to have twins so we are making sure she is well fed so that she has enough energy to feed herself and the lambs. Ewan and the bachelor boys have learnt to climb one of the boundary banks so they can hoover up the lambs' sugarbeet. They obviously weren't too impressed by their diet. Working rams lose weight very quickly

while they are busy (if you catch our drift) but the bachelor boys don't. They are the sheep equivalent of couch potatoes, focusing only on their fleeces and their stomachs. Needless to say when the bucket of food doesn't stop at their gate they shout relentlessly at whoever is carrying said bucket. The lambs aren't too fussed by the shenanigans of the boys, though they have also discovered that banks are fun. We had a bit of emergency fencing to do as a result of this! Their little fleeces are growing very well and hopefully we'll be able to make some fantastically soft knitwear in the future with their help. (Not the knitting, the growing - they can't work knitting machines!)

The chickens are still on Chicken Lockdown due to Bird Flu. They aren't too impressed but have been coping by dust bathing in the sheep shed and chasing cabbages and bananas around their patch. We've started working with the Tintagel Pantry to help distribute and use food that isn't collected from them on a Friday. Anything that isn't up to scratch goes to the hens and things that


can be used are collected from us or we make them into products that go back to the Pantry. It has been a real eye opener to see how much food is going to landfill and equally how many people need a little extra help. We're very privileged to be able to help out; so if you ever see something non-seasonal in our little egg sales point as watermelon!) (such please feel free to help yourself. We have a little slate up so you know what is grown by us and what is from the Pantry. Any donations given go straight back to the Pantry so that they can help our community.

In the coming weeks we're hoping to buckle down and throw ourselves into more outside work as the weather permits. As usual, we have grand ideas and a small workforce! By the time Summer is in full swing we are hoping to have the vegetable patch up and running, a new compost bin and shredding area built and one of the sheds partially dismantled and rebuilt. We're going to need a few cups of tea and a lot of biscuits!



Moore graduated from the University of Chicago Laboratory Schools 1999 and also, in 2003, received a bachelor of arts degree in religious history from Columbia University. Moore is now a New York Times bestselling novelist and Academy Award-winning filmmaker. His novels, The Holdout (2020), The Last Days of Night (2016), and The Sherlockian (2010), have been published in 24 countries and translated into 19 languages. All three were New York Times bestsellers.

'The Holdout' is about the disappearance, after school, of a fifteen-yearold girl, who is heiress to a billion-dollar real estate fortune. Her teacher Bobby Nook, is the prime suspect after the discovery of an illicit text message on her phone. The book is centred around the theme of murder. It explores details of the crime and follows the details of the trial through the eyes of the jurors.

The book has two distinct narratives. The past murder from fifteen years before and present investigation into a subsequent murder. This was confusing to some bookworms however, others thought it added mystery and suspense. The book was exploring truth and lies which some bookworms thought built tension in a very engaging way whilst others thought the subterfuge was implausible and farfetched.

We all acknowledged that there was cause for concern that jurors did not receive all the information and that information was seemingly amended and even that evidence was manipulated. It was quite an eye opener to how things can go wrong.

Each of the closing chapters were devoted to individual jurors. Some bookworms found them tedious and the others felt the information in them would have served the book better had it been sprinkled amongst the earlier text.

EV or not EV?

My old buddy and excolleague David would object to being called mildly eccentric. He collects Rupert Bear annuals but is mad keen on technology. Someone who laces his speech with "Good oh, "Blow me down" and "what a jolly wheeze" farmhouse powers his outside St Breward from a massive electric storage battery and is currently on his third EV. Both he and wife Anna shares his adoration for an MG SX with swish interior, silent and swift.

Stunned by the sudden rise in fuel costs, like so many I am asking: is electric the answer?

I sought David's advice. Charging, overnight on Economy 7, is peanuts. But to buy electric is not, think north of £30,000. engine, gearbox or exhaust, fewer moving parts so maintenance is easier, and no road tax or congestion charges, and of course, less pollution. However not all are enthusiastic. "Which" magazine reports that electric vehicles are the least reliable, largely owing to software complications.

By contrast, electric-hybrid vehicles are the best.

Chief drawback: range anxiety. David reckons to halve manufacturers' claimed figures and expects still less in the cold, or if towing a load. There is a woeful national shortage of charge points. It took him careful planning to achieve a 1300-mile round trip to Northumberland, greeted at each charging point by other intrepid travellers. Wisely Anna keeps her petrol car in reserve.

The main element of the EV is the battery, weighing over 300 kilos and costing £6,000 for those models with highest mileage range. Ignoring, for arguments' sake the environmental impact of extracting "rare earth" minerals - lithium, cobalt and nickel – then refining, transportation and manufacturing costs, battery technology has still not developed sufficiently to power ships, planes or heavy goods vehicles.

Are you hoping to drive abroad?. The AA urges careful forethought as Europe won't convert until 2035, five years behind us. Factor in that each country has different charging arrangements.



The decision to buy an EV is probably a foregone conclusion. The idea has gripped governments just as surely as medieval societies sought the philosopher's stone or perpetual motion. All citizens will be forced to conform.

Eventually, economies of scale will reduce vehicle prices, there will be a roll-out of charging stations across the UK, including rural areas, and somehow home charging issues will be sorted.

Dinosaur petrolheads will be increasingly hammered by increased fuel costs, road taxes, congestion charges and emission controls. Their

only consolation: there is no such thing as a free lunch. The fuel taxes they once paid – 57p per litre of fuel and 20% VAT, adding up to around £60 billion a year - will now have to be recouped elsewhere. Guess who pays. The motoring journalists I contacted admitted there may be an "adjustment" of VAT rates on electricity but the more likely outcome is drivers will be directly taxed via usage charges or road tolls. However you propagandize the green revolution, it isn't going to save you money.

Waiting in the wings is research into sodium or hydrogen technology. Lithium-ion EVs may have had their day, plausible but ultimately unworkable, displayed alongside steam cars and hovercraft and Concorde in the Museum of It Seemed A Good Idea at the Time...

WHERE DO YOU PUT YOURS?

We all purchase various liquid drinks like fruit juices, milk alternatives, long life milk and soups for example, which today are most often packaged in what are known as Tetrapak, Elopack, or SIG containers. You'll know you have one, just look at the bottom of the container. These containers provide us all with great convenience. I'm going to use the term "Tetrapak" to cover all such containers, regardless of the manufacturer, because Tetrapak is the main player in the industry.

These composite made up of packages wood fibre, polymers and, aluminium linings provide us all with far longer shelf life for our favourite beverages, and appear be environmentally depending friendly, your definition. Tetrapak supplies 60,000 alone tonnes of packages every year in the UK. I have wondered for years just how these containers provide us sustainable packaging, and, how exactly they are recycled?


The industry group funds a company called Alliance for Beverage Cartons and the Environment (ACE), which co-ordinates Tetrapak

recycling. This operation includes just one facility located in the UK, in Stainland, West Yorkshire, and that is only capable of recycling up to 40% of all such cartons used in the UK every year. So where do the other 60% go?

Of the 14 household waste recycling centres in Cornwall, you can only deposit Tetrapak your cartons for them to be recycled at 10 of them. The closest centre to Boscastle is at Tiscott Wood near Bude. So, unless you're already going to there, you'll need to make a special trip, which hardly seems sustainable. Cornwall's Tetrapak recycling locations can be found using an online search 'Tetrapak recycling Cornwall'.

ACE does in fact facilitate kerbside Tetrapak collection in half of the UK. So, what about Cornwall?

According to 'Reduce, Reuse, Recycle' editor Jacqui "Since O'Brien, Tetrapak have offered advice and financial support for councils to initiate recycling schemes, so your local council don't really have any excuse for not recycling them!"



Cornwall Councillor Barry Jordan has explained the Council's current position:

"There is no kerb side collection of tetra packs because we cannot recycle them due to their complex makeup, I will forward you a list of the HWRC's that do collect, but they have to be taken to Halifax which is the only tetra recycling facility, we encourage the message of asking people to consider buying the product in a more recyclable material like glass or plastic, although the containers are not that environmentally friendly the contents such as almond milk isn't either given the footprint of almonds! We do not currently have any plans to recycle them as it would mean either adding them to the cardboard bag and

then sorting at the MRF or having another bag!"

Maybe ACE could/ should do more. instance, providing drop off bins for Tetrapaks at every supermarket? What if every supermarket selling these packages took the drop off bins of empty Tetrapaks back to their central warehouses for ACE to pick up? Maybe ACE could set up logistics to transport these bins by rail to their recycling facility? What would happen if ACE provided Tetrapak drop off bins in every village?

Should we as consumers insist that packaging manufacturers for products purchase be held accountable provide to simple recycling for their packages?

Incidentally, Cornwall Council published recycling figures for 2019/2020 show that only 33.3% of all its collected kerbside waste is recycled, lower than the UK average. So where does the other 66.6% of all our kerbside collected waste end up in Cornwall?

Skylarks

Skylarks have suffered huge losses in this country but we still have some using the stitches. Skylarks generally make 2-3 nesting attempts in the same area of farmland during a long breeding season. Autumn sown cereals are too tall and dense to allow skylarks to raise more than one early brood, whereas Spring-sown cereals, such as the crops at Forrabury, allow skylarks to make later nesting attempts. Skylarks nest on the ground, in vegetation which is 20-50 cm high. This vegetation must be open enough to give the birds easy access to the ground.

Skylarks advertise their territories by a spectacular song-flight, during which the bird rises almost vertically with rapid wing-beats, hovering for several minutes and then parachuting down.

It doesn't matter how gentle or well-trained dogs are, they will prevent ground-nesting birds from nesting if they are allowed to run free.

Skylarks need to make two or three nesting attempts between April and August to sustain the population so please keep dogs on a lead during the summer and avoid walking along the strip boundaries.

The recent power cuts brought back memories of my Scottish childhood - the unheated bedroom with ice on the inside of the windows; attempting to dress whilst still under the bed clothes and jostling, with the rest of the family, for space around a small coal fire in the kitchen (the only room in the house to be heated - if you could call it heat!).

The power cut also reminded me of the Three Day Week, which began on 1st January and ended on 7th March, 1974. Throughout the week, in homes and businesses, electricity was turned off for several days (Wikipedia tells me it was three consecutive days and that it was to conserve coal supplies. It is all very political so I won't bother you with it.).

I became expert in cooking over an open fire, a skill I recently discovered I retain. (Obviously, somewhere in my DNA

lurks a Stone-Age ancestor.) However, my cooking was not appreciated by certain members of the family.

Daughter: "Mother, what are these black bits on my poached egg?"

Mother: "It's just soot, scrape them off and eat it."

40+ years later, dear Daughter still reminds me of the 'Sooty Egg' and NO I didn't poison her. Hardly surprising that, after her Egg-perience, she decided to train as a Chef - and married one. No more Sooty Eggs for her!

Shopping was done by torch light, since the town's small supermarket was in darkness. (Wikipedia also tells me Supermarkets were exempt from power cuts - not the one in my town!) We overcame most of the difficulties, caused by the lack of electricity. Unlike today, we did not have all the modern paraphernalia which is dependant on electricity. The reduction in my husband's wage

packet was the one thing we could not overcome. I can't remember Family Income Support or any other Government benefit being publicised, as they are today. In any case, we were unaware of benefits, we 'tightened our belts' and coped.

Where I was living there were few kindly neighbours

to check if I was alright. This time, however, friends and neighbours were quick to knock on my door to check all was well with me and to offer to heat food or fill flasks with hot water.

I send grateful thanks to all my kind neighbours for their concern. It shows that whatever life throws at us, our community will always be there to help.

A Long Way from Farm to Plate

Cornish cauliflowers travel up to two hundred miles before arriving in Cornish supermarkets. With that in mind I thought this article would interest Blowhole readers.

Most farmers would prefer not to supply supermarkets, and see better opportunities for their own livelihoods, protecting nature, and connecting with their local communities elsewhere, a new survey has found.

A poll by sustainable food alliance Sustain of 500 farmers across England and Wales found 86% were currently supplying a supermarket or large food processor, but only one in five would 'prefer' to continue doing so.

representative In sample of small medium farms, including arable, livestock, horticulture and mixed, the survey found the top three preferred places to supply food were a food hub (55%), direct sales such as through a veg box scheme (36%), and the eating out sector (29%). The reasons cited for why farmers preferred these options were a better price,

business stability, more control, direct links to customer, and supporting climate and nature ambitions.

The report also highlighted case studies of supply chains that are working well for farmers, such as the Helston Local Food Hub in Cornwall, which works with thirty Cornish food producers and where 80% of each £1 spent by the consumer goes back to the farm. Another example showed Manchester-based Organic North, part of the Better Food Traders network, can keep its prices affordable while paying staff and producers fairly because they are a co-op without shareholder pressure.

"We would like to see all our produce being sold to local consumers who would be able to appreciate better its provenance as a result of seeing the system in operation on some of their favourite countryside walks," one farmer responder wrote.

Half of those asked, said lack of access to affordable finance meant they couldn't switch markets, alongside



lack of time to research, plus no local customer base.

Sustain said the new data provides a "valuable picture of how and why farmers want to access better and fairer supply chains". The survey also highlighted the need for local infrastructure like veg box schemes, auctions and markets and social networks, to allow this happen. transition to Currently, infrastructure like grading, storage, packaging, distribution and trading of food is highly centralised, large and suited complex and long-distance supply chains.

"In a general sense, the results reveal that farmers want to shift away from the dominance and reliance of supplying supermarkets and large manufacturers, and instead, have a much greater diversity of market outlets like food hubs, box schemes and independent retailers which they can access" Sustain said.

"The data also provides insight into why farmers want to make those changes. This includes fairer pay and more direct relationships with customers, as well as being rewarded for environmentally friendly farming and building more resilient businesses."
